## **PAA Campus Renewal Update**

In previous messages we have talked about the Type III hearing the City of Portland requires as one of the steps we must take in order to move forward toward a projected remodel. These hearings are to address certain "non-

conforming" issues with permits attached to the original master plan that the constituency voted to abandon in the fall of 2019, in favor of a possible phased remodel.

Late last year we received word from the City that because of changes to city regulations earlier in the year, the single Type III hearing was changed to two Type II hearings – which could be addressed simultaneously – and a Land Division hearing, to be held after the Type II hearings.

Because of that change, additional surveys and studies were required that had not yet been undertaken.

## Q: Does the change to Type II and Land Division hearings nullify the previously submitted application for a Type III hearing and delay the hearings?

The previously submitted application serves for the new hearings. Our attorney, architect, engineering and contractor firms all have been working diligently behind the scenes to address any additional needs and the typical backand-forth of questions and answers from the City in preparing for the hearings. As of late March we have not received any hearing dates. The current projection is perhaps late in the summer of 2022, but we won't know for certain until the dates are assigned.

## Q: We're concerned about the safety of students because of the homeless camps and neighborhood.

While the homeless camps may appear to pose a threat to student safety, we have had no incidents from homeless individuals that endangered students. One morning a homeless individual was found sleeping in the tech building after breaking a window to get in. The individual was immediately removed

without incident.

The good news we have been told is that the City recently passed a measure to prohibit all camping near schools. We continue to work closely with the police and safety organizations to ensure all possible safety plans and precautions are implemented. Each officer or agent we meet with affirms PAA's safety measures.

You may have heard about an attempted carjacking last fall by an individual who drove into our south parking lot after school hours. Fortunately no students were harmed, staff and students followed emergency protocols, police responded to the school, and shortly thereafter apprehended the suspect.

One of the ways we're seeking to further increase safety is to better regulate entry and exit from the south parking lot by installing automatic security gates.

We are currently in the planning stages of a campaign, to be launched in a few weeks, to raise \$150,000 for state-of-the-art security gates for all three south parking lot vehicle gates that can be operated remotely and regulated by PIN or key card access.

## Finding Ways to Help Others

It doesn't take long when talking to Deisy (Cholula) Haid '06 for her to use the word "purpose."

Today Deisy is field education director and assistant professor of social work and sociology at Walla Walla University (WWU), where she focuses on practicum placements for social work students.

She was recently named the 2022 Social Work Educator of the Year by the Washington chapter of the National Association of Social Workers for her role in meeting the challenges of placing students where they could meet practicum requirements during the pandemic while studying remotely.

At age 15 when Deisy entered the foster care system, it was the first encounter with her social worker that ignited her desire to work with children in foster care.

"I knew I wanted to help people – that's my passion, my calling. It's like there's a reason why I went through those experiences as a child," she says.

Deisy's life changed when she was taken in by an Adventist foster care family, who sent her to Tualatin Valley Academy for two years, then to PAA for her final two years.

She describes a PAA chapel that had a profound impact on her when a faculty member spoke to students.

## Deisy Haid '06 Finds Ways to Live Out Her Purpose

This story is an expanded version of the article published in the Spring 2022 print issue of Vista Verde.

It doesn't take long when talking to Deisy (Cholula) Haid '06 for her to mention her "purpose," something that developed in her teen years and fueled by her less-than-ideal childhood.

Today Deisy is field education director and assistant professor of social work and sociology at Walla Walla University (WWU), where she focuses on practicum placements for social work students.

She was recently named the 2022 Social Work Educator of the Year by the Washington chapter of the National Association of Social Workers for her role in meeting the challenges of placing students where they could meet practicum requirements during the pandemic while studying remotely. And she played a major role in establishing a no-cost, same-day mental health services clinic in Walla Walla.

Because of the pandemic, she had to scale back placements at community partners, which resulted in two programs being developed to help students from falling behind.

The first was to find on-campus placements in different areas, such as student life, dormitories and student success center.

The second program came from a partnership with two community entities, Providence St. Mary's Population Health Department and Anchor Point Counseling Services, in developing a walk-in, same-day mental health clinic, similar to an urgent care medical clinic. The program is modeled after WWU's Billings, Mont., student-run outpatient clinic and a walk-in clinic Deisy knew of in the Portland area.

Now called Blue Mountain Health Cooperative, Providence St. Mary's provides the clinic building and Anchor Point provides administrative support and insurance billing, while master's program students provide mental health counseling and bachelor's program students provide navigation services, all at no cost to clients.

With these two programs in place, students now have a path to attain licensure as licensed clinical social workers (LCSW).

After earning her bachelor's and master's degrees in social work at WWU, Deisy landed work in the Portland-Vancouver area as a family intervention

specialist, a clinical supervisor and a placement manager, and earned her LCSW license.

Then in 2017 WWU came knocking, inviting her to fill the field placement director position. She's the first Latina faculty member in the department, which has influenced the growth in the number of Hispanic social work students.

At age 15 when Deisy entered the foster care system, it was the first encounter with her social worker that had a deep impact and set the trajectory of her passion and profession, as he was "talking to me about God in this new environment, because I didn't grow up with any religion until I went into an Adventist foster home. Then he's talking to me about God in my current experience, and validating me."

That's when she knew. "I want to be like that guy, across the table from

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me. I want to work with children in foster care." She had found her purpose.

"I knew I wanted to help people - that's my passion, my calling - and just being able to give someone else that reassurance in using my purpose," she continues. "It's like there's a reason why I went through those experiences as a child.

"So I knew that Jesus was going to use that experience to help others. My biggest thing has been, how can I maximize the number of people that I can

help?"

Deisy's life changed when she was taken in by an Adventist foster care family, who sent her to Tualatin Valley Academy for two years, then to PAA for her junior and senior years.

She describes a PAA chapel that had a profound impact on her when one of the faculty members spoke to students.

Deisy and her husband, John, have two girls, 5 and 8 years of age. John, too, helps students find their way, working for Walla Walla Community College at the state penitentiary with inmates in the GED and vocational training programs.

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

The pandemic has been a blessing in disguise, Deisy says, because she's been able to spend time with her kids, which has led to regular "family dinners."

"So we talk with our kids about, what are your talents, what are your skills, what are you enjoying? We want them to know that God has called them for something amazing. And how do we figure that out?" she says. "That's something that's been important to me in figuring out who I am and what my strengths and weaknesses are, and trying to use my purpose for God.

"We get to share stories about how we're helping people, and how our entire family is helping people in different ways," she says. "So though I'm not a practicing social worker working directly with clients, it still feels like my job isn't a job. I feel like I'm living out my purpose."
